This billiard room has multiple areas and functions, seating at an antique English walnut fireplace, billiard area, music area and a game table complete this space. A 19th-century, 12 foot silver leaded French doorway sets the stage as you enter the room. A palette of reds, ochre, olive, chocolate and black warms this space. A mix of soul, oriental and armenian prints layer as "floor cloths." The red center sofa is the anchor for all other patterns. Leather, tapestries and antique textiles complement each other. The high ceiling is beamed while large plaster gothic plaques fill the slopes of the ceiling.
